



The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure buried in a field.

This time of year is "wedding season." So many young couples are starting a new phase of their lives together. We are also approaching the start of the academic year. Students are going off to college and beginning a new phase as young adults. New spouses, newly independent adults, and new empty nesters are blessed with incredible opportunity and tasked with great responsibility for this new stage of their lives.

Solomon was a mere youth when called by God to succeed his father David. He was given the great opportunity and responsibility to govern God's people as their new king. In this new stage of his life, Solomon has big shoes to fill. Solomon admits to God: You made me king, but I don't know how to do it – how to act, how to judge, how to live up to such great expectations. Just as importantly, Solomon asks for the Lord's help.

We can relate to Solomon when we are called to new stages in our lives. We may wonder how we will live up to the tasks of marriage or parenthood; how we will handle ourselves as independent adults; how we will make the right decisions and meet expectations in our new ventures. Solomon asked, and God gave Solomon what he needed for his task: a wise and understanding heart for governing God's people. God entrusted Solomon with the opportunity and responsibility to serve as king, and Solomon trusted God to provide him with exactly what he needed to succeed.

This relationship of trust is what Paul speaks of when writing to the Romans: All things work for good for those who love God. To love God is to be in a relationship of trust, as was Solomon. God entrusts Solomon with his purpose, and Solomon trusts God to provide for him, and ultimately to justify and glorify him. This is the love of God that we are called to. It is the love between God the Father and Christ his Son, and in Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit, we know this love.

When we know this love – this relationship of trust – we know the joy, the infinite value, of the kingdom of heaven of which Jesus speaks. We easily recognize it and nothing we have compares. It is like a buried treasure or pearl of great price that we find and sell all we have for it. It is like seeing a net full of fish and knowing exactly what the good stuff is. All we want is God's love and nothing else will do.

As we enter new stages with great responsibilities, the one who loves us and entrusts us with these opportunities will provide us with what we need. Part of the joy of loving God and being in that relationship of trust with him is the assurance that all things work for the good of those who love him. We may sometimes forget this, sometimes feel fearful or overwhelmed, but when we return to God's word and participate in the sacraments as we do today, we are reminded and reassured. God's got this, and so, then, do we.
